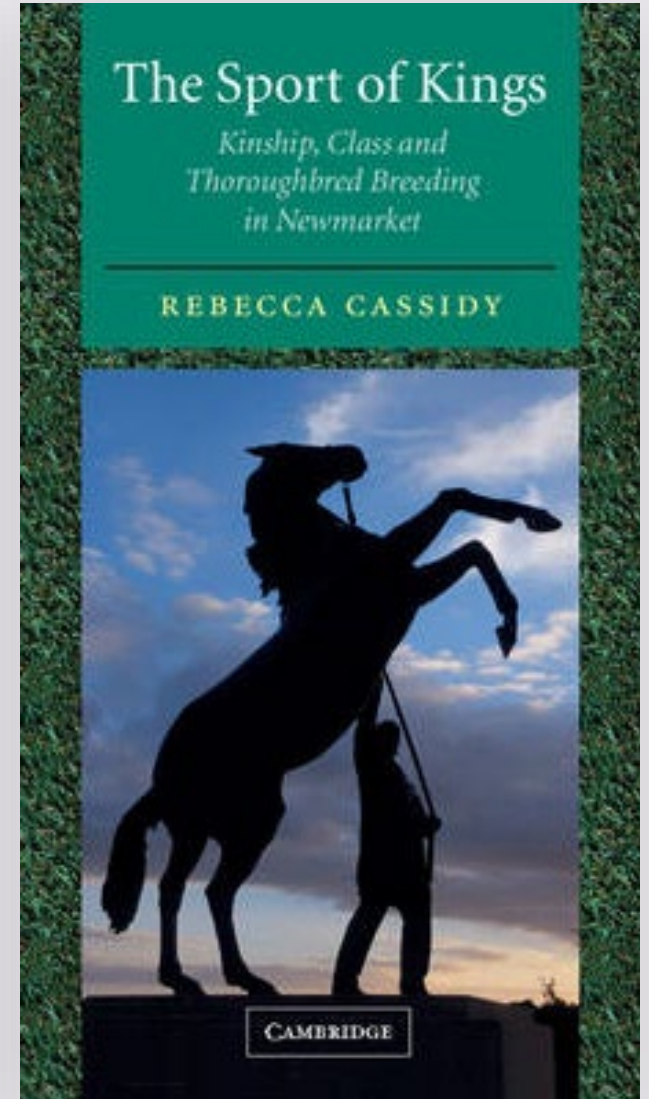
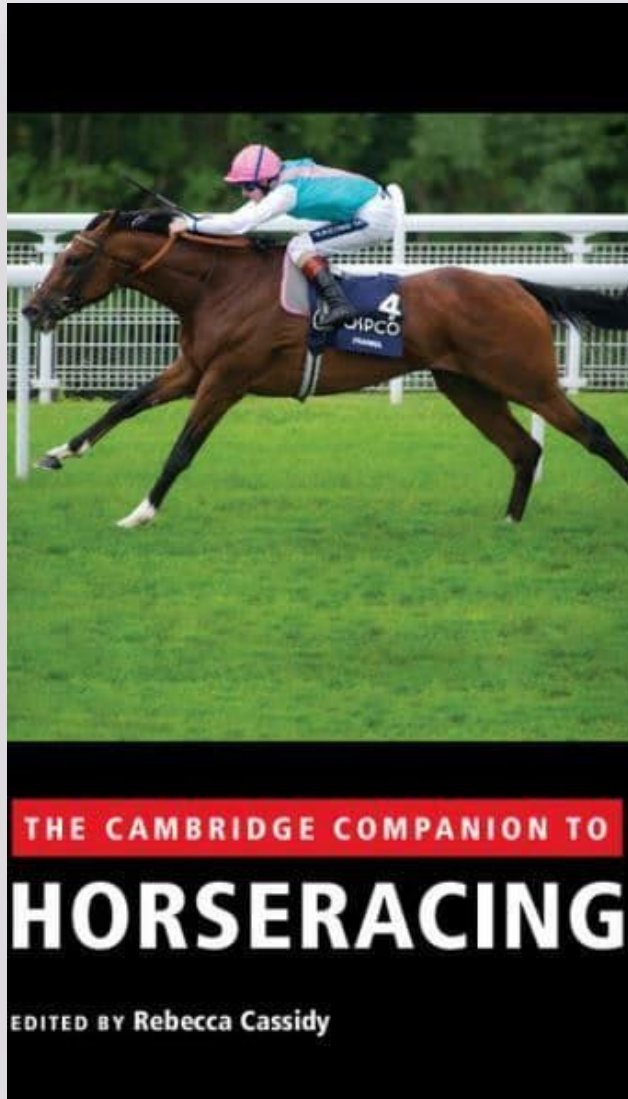

Hunton's New Traditional Community Orchard Plan

Descriptions of proposed fruit varieties to be planted in the new community orchard at Hunton

APPLES

Beauty of Bath - A popular very early season dessert apple with a distinctive sharp taste. Somerset UK 1864

Beauty of Kent - A popular Victorian English cooking apple. Kent UK 1820

Bramley's Seedling - More commonly referred to simply as Bramley is undoubtedly the classic English cooking apple. Nottinghamshire UK 1809

Colonel Vaughan - An apple also known as Kentish Pippin is an old Kent variety once used for cider making. Kent UK 1600

Christmas Pearmain - Raised by Mr Mannser, introduced by G Bunyard. It is a pretty apple, sweet and quite richly flavoured. Kent UK 1893

Concord - This apple is self-sterile and would require a pollinator to produce a crop.

Edward VII - A mild flavoured late season cooker with very attractive blossom. Worcestershire UK 1902

Falstaff - A crisp, juicy and attractive dessert apple. It is easy to grow and ideal as a garden variety. Kent UK 1965

Flower of Kent - This apple which is said to have prompted Newton to formulate his theory of gravitation when he saw the fruit falling to the ground. For this reason it is also known as the Isaac Newton's Tree. Kent UK 1629

Gascoynes Scarlet - A Victorian Kentish variety. Produces pink juice. Kent UK 1871

Gladstone - A red flushed summer apple. Crisp and juicy with a raspberry flavour. Worcestershire UK 1868

Golden Knob - A small russet apple with an intense sweet-sharp flavour. Somerset UK 1700

Lady Sudeley - This apple is partially self-fertile. Kent UK 1849

Lord Lambourne - This is a popular traditional English mid season apple. Bedfordshire UK 1907

Maidstone Favourite - This is a pretty striped apple. Kent UK 1913

Millers Seedling - A small Victorian apple which ripens late August. Berkshire UK 1848

Sunset - An excellent garden substitute for Cox. Kent UK 1918

Tydemans Late Orange - A good late dessert apple. Kent UK 1930

APPLES

Tydemans Early Worcester - This apple is very juicy and sweet with a hint of strawberry flavour. Kent UK 1945

Worcester Pearmain - A very popular sweet early dessert apple. Worcestershire UK 1873

CRAB APPLE

Nuvor Carnival Crab - This apple has pink blossom in April/May and attractive small to medium sized red crab apples in late autumn. It produces an excellent red jelly.

PEARS

The pears will be planted as espaliers to cover up some of the panel fencing

Beth - This one of the earliest pears to ripen. It has good flavour and is a reliable cropper. Kent UK 1938

Brandy - This is a traditional perry pear with small red flushed fruit. Gloucestershire. UK 1800

Concorde - This is an excellent modern dessert pear suitable for most locations. Kent UK 1977

Conference - The most well known and popular variety in the UK. Suitable for most locations. Herefordshire UK 1885

PLUM

White Magnum Bonham - A culinary plum, highly esteemed for preserving.

COBNUITS

Local cobnut varieties will be sourced and planted along the fence line.

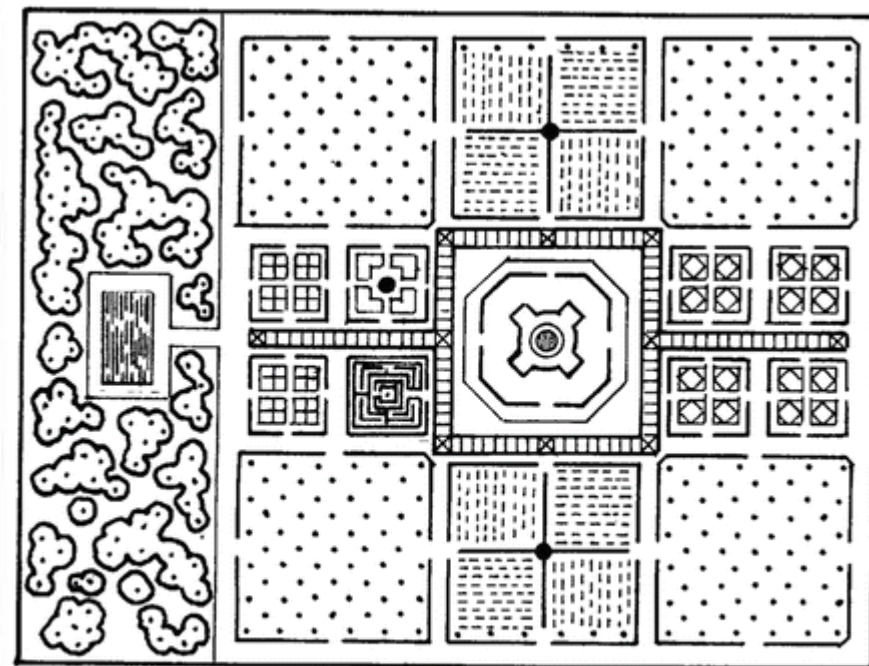
CHERRY

A self fertile variety and many of them begin with the letter 'S' otherwise pollinators are required.

SOFT FRUIT BUSHES

Current Varieties - Varieties of redcurrants, pink currants and white currants will be planted under the fruit trees.

Gooseberry Varieties - Varieties of both dessert and cooking varieties will also be planted under the fruit trees.

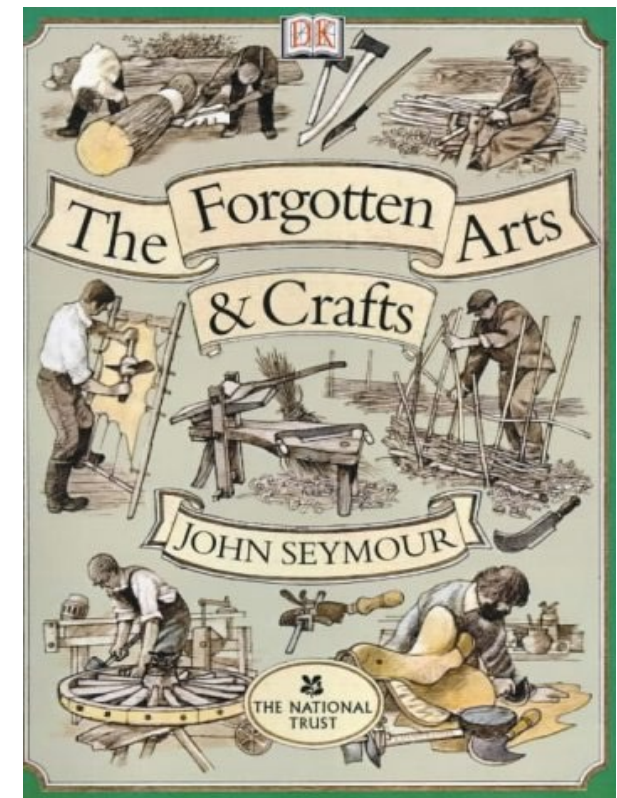
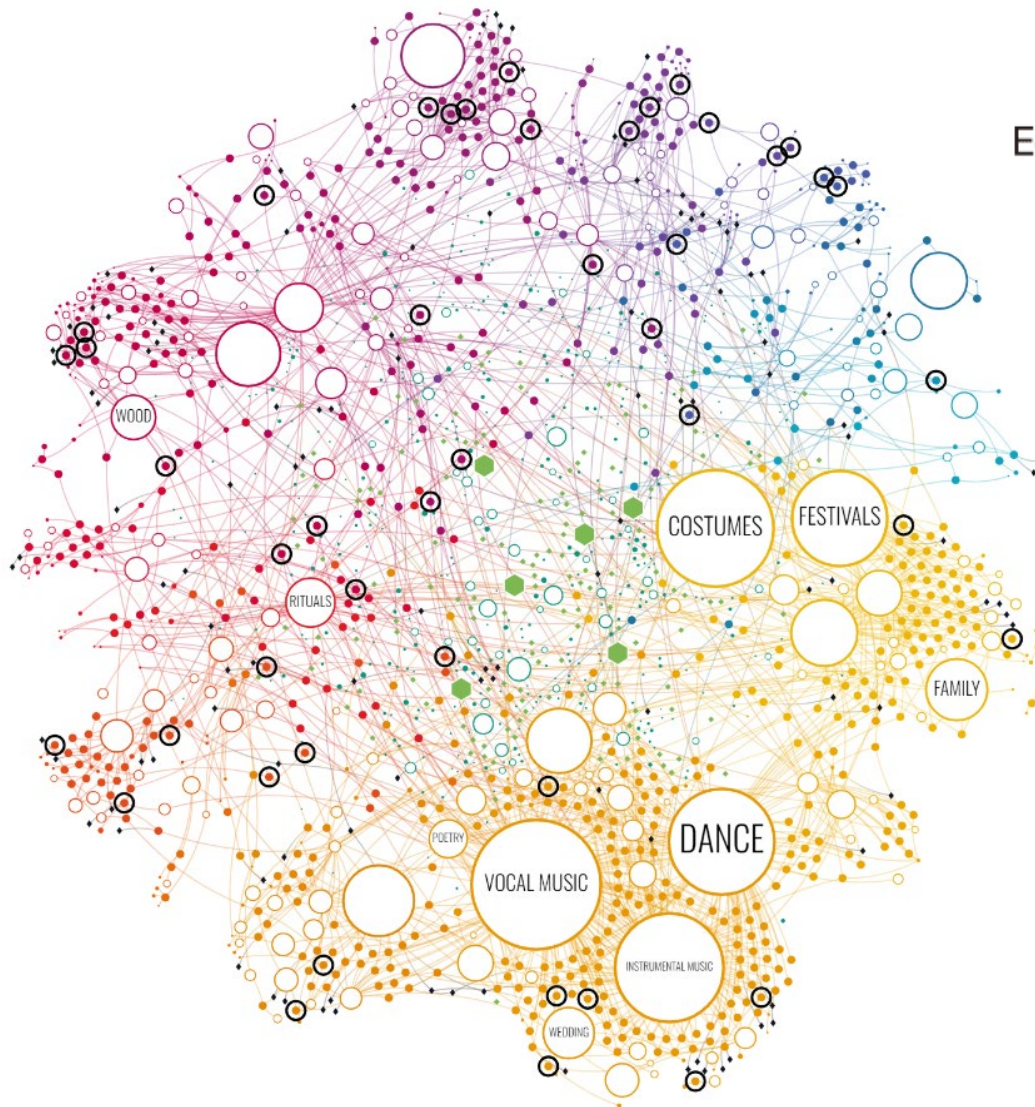

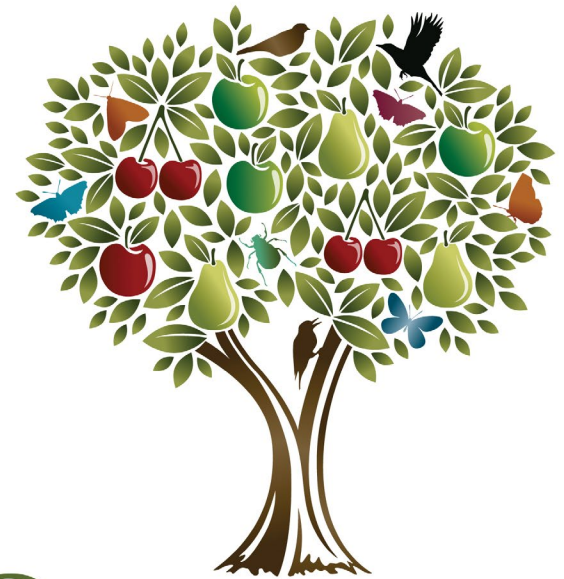
